

Presenting your story

Think of your video as a story. All good stories contain certain elements.

Keep in mind the 5Ws: who, what, when, where and why.

There are two ways of laying out your story: a storyboard or a script.

Storyboard

- The storyboard will give those involved in the production information on the overall mood and feel of the final product.
- It contains info on graphics, video, sound, text, audio interaction, color, type fonts, type size, etc.
- It needs to be detailed enough so each crew member knows what to do and what is happening throughout the whole movie and exactly what it will look like.

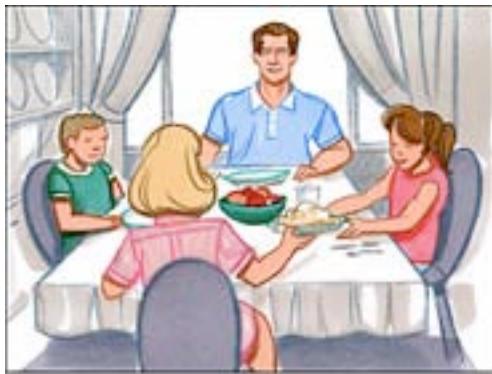


Storyboard

- Storyboard contains a rough sketch representation of the video.
- A storyboard is essentially a timeline going from top to bottom, with the top occurring first.
- The major advantage of a storyboard over a script is that it allows you to see what the scene will look like.

Script

The script style is similar to reading a book.
It is very useful for dialogue intensive pieces.

PHIL LOOKS AT THE KIDNAPPER, GUN POISED, HARD EYES BEHIND THE SKI-MASK.

PHIL

First untie her. I want to make sure you haven't hurt her.
